Bunting - help us celebrate our 65th anniversary

Join our community members in making and decorating bunting pennants for us to use when we celebrate our 65th anniversary, once lockdown is relaxed.

You can make one or multiple pennants and return them to us individually or already strung together. Our weavery teams will string together those that aren't already strung.

You can use any material or decoration on your bunting.

It's free to take part but if you would like to make a donation towards our 65th anniversary or fundraise for us, this would be very much appreciated.

Fundraising ideas

- Ask your friends and family to sponsor you to make five or ten pennants.
- Drop off a 'bunting decorating kit' (pre-cut / sewn bunting flag and items people could use to decorate their bunting, such as buttons, beads, ribbon, wool, sheet of felt, embroidery thread, felt tip pens) on your friends' doorsteps and ask them to decorate a bunting flag and return it with a £l donation.
- Arrange a 'virtual bunting party'. Get your friends together on Zoom, Messenger, or any other internet platforms and spend some 'virtual' time together whilst you decorate your bunting. Ask everyone who joins to make a small donation.

How to make your bunting

Double sided bunting

- I. Use the template to cut two pieces of fabric, following the dark green outer line as your guide.
- 2. Decorate your two pieces of bunting on the 'good' side of each piece of fabric (your decoration should not extend beyond the pink stitch lines or above the black top line).
- **3.** Place the two decorated flags together with the decorated sides facing each other and pin around the edge.
- 4. Leaving approximately a Icm border hand or machine stitch down the 2 edges of the 'V' shape (highlighted with pink wide dotted lines on the template), leave the top edge open.
- 5. Remove the pins. Fold over the top edge of each pennant and the two short angled side edges by Icm (highlighted by the pink solid line on the template) and iron each of these down. Gently iron the rest of the pennant.
- 6. Turn your pennant the right way round, so that your decoration is on the outside. Make sure you get the bottom of your V pulled out, as best you can.
- 7. Stitch along the top of the pennant, so that the rough edges of the pennant are now completely enclosed.
- 8 Turn down the top edge by a further I.5cm, so that you have a perfect triangle (illustrated by the top black line on the template). Stitch along the bottom edge of the turnover, leaving the 2 sides open, creating a tube. This tube will be used for the bunting string to go through.
- 9. Congratulations, your bunting is now complete!

Quick bunting method

- 1. Use the template to cut a single piece of fabric, following the dark green outer line as your guide.
- 2. Fold over the edges of your fabric by Icm, all the way round and iron it down (marked by the pink wide dotted line). Stitch or glue the line down.
- **3.** Fold over the top by approximately Icm (highlighted with the pink solid line) iron down the fold. Make sure you fold it over on the same side as the rest of your edging so that one side of your pennant has no edges showing.
- 4. Fold the top over again by another I.5cm, enclosing the raw edge so that you now have a perfect triangle (illustrated by the top black line on the template). Stitch along the bottom edge of the turnover, leaving the 2 sides open, creating a tube, and stitch along the edge. This tube will be used for the bunting string to go through.
- 5. Decorate the pennant on the side with no stitching/folding or on both sides if you prefer!
- 6. Congratulations, your bunting is now complete!

Stringing your bunting

If you have made several pennants you can string them together by either stitching them onto ribbon to bias tape or threading them onto ribbon using the top tube. Or you can return your pennants unstrung and our weavery team will string them for you.

Whether you have made I or IO, the pennants will all help us to celebrate our 65th anniversary. Thank you.
